



NINTERIZE YOUR HOME

hile the onset of the cold season will vary depending on your region, it's a good rule of thumb to begin the process of winterizing your home in early fall. If you decide to DIY it, this will give you plenty of time to do it at your own pace. However, if you are hiring a pro, you will need to schedule service appointments as soon as possibleperhaps even request them during the summer-so that you can get any necessary work completed before the weather turns for the worse.

Winterizing your home means preparing it both inside and out for the cold weather. The following tasks don't necessarily have to be completed in order, but they should all be completed by the time the cold weather arrives.

1. Clean the Gutters

Gutters are the workhorses of your home's exterior. They direct rainwater and snow away from your roof to prevent water from seeping in and causing damage. But gutters can't do this very important job when they're clogged with dead leaves and other debris. Whether you hire someone to do it for you or climb a ladder yourself, make sure your gutters are clear before the first snowfall.

TIP: A telescoping gutter wand makes it easier and faster to clean your gutters.

2. Inspect the Roof and Attic

Now's the time to make any repairs to your roof so that it won't leak in the rain or the snow. If you have

attic, replace or add insulation to keep drafts out. TIP: Be sure to wear gloves whenever you are handling fiberglass insulation.

3. Check the Chimney

If you have a fireplace, you'll want to make sure the chimney is clear of any buildup. A dirty chimney can be a fire hazard, so hire a chimney sweep to ensure it's clear and you can build fires safely all season.

TIP: If you don't actively use your fireplace, inflate a chimney balloon and plug up the space to keep out the cold.

4. Weatherproof Windows and Doors

Cold air can creep in through windows and doors, so be sure to replace any weatherstripping around them. Apply caulking to seal any gaps around windows-you can also do this for any cracks in the siding, too. Unless you have newer, energy-efficient windows, you can apply window film to keep out the cold. A door sweep installed on the bottom of your door can keep drafts out, too.

TIP: To find the source of a draft, hold a lit candle a couple of inches away from a window or door. If the flame is extinguished, apply caulking or weatherstripping to that spot.

5. Protect the Pipes

Frozen pipes can burst during the winter and cause major problems for homeowners. Here are some things you can do to avoid this wintertime nightmare:

. Know the location of your main water shutoff so that you can access it quickly in an emergency.

· Drain the water from outdoor sprinkler systems and garden hoses. Disconnect garden hoses from faucets and store them in a garage or shed. Cover the faucets.

• Fix or replace any broken windows so that cold air can't get into a room and freeze pipes, particularly in the basement.

· Walk the perimeter of your

home and close off any other vents that you might have opened during the warmer weather.

TIP: If you're going to be away from your home during the winter, be sure to keep your thermostat set to about 55 degrees Fahrenheit. A programmable thermostat makes it easy to keep your house at the right temperature so that your pipes won't freeze.

6. Service the HVAC system

Replace your furnace filter and schedule a service appointment so that your heating system is ready to go before you need it. This might mean scheduling a service call when you've got your AC pumping during the summer because service appointments can be hard to get during the height of the season.

TIP: If you live in a climate where there are four distinct seasons, have your HVAC serviced twice a year so that it runs well in both the cold weather and hot weather.

7. Prepare Your Patio and Deck

This is particularly important if you live in a region where snow is likely. Cover patio furniture with weatherproof covers or, if possible, store it away in a garage or shed. If your deck is wooden, a fresh coat of sealant will protect it in wet weather.

TIP: Some patio furniture can be left out in the cold weather without being damaged. It all depends on the material used in making it. Teak furniture, for example, can stand up to winter, though furniture made from other types of wood cannot. When in doubt, cover or store your outdoor furniture.

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COST OF GAS ADJUSTMENTS FOR COMING YEAR

Zia Natural Gas Company has applied to the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission to adjust its Gas Cost Factor for the next year, effective October 1, 2022. The cost of purchasing and transporting gas to the Zia Natural Gas system is passed directly through to the customer as a Gas Cost Factor. A regulated utility is not allowed to mark up the cost of gas. Zia Natural Gas Company negotiates our contracts every year in an effort to ensure the best possible price in the market for our customers. Currently, our average residential Colfa customer in New Mexico uses 30 ccf in October.

As always, Zia Natural Gas Company encourages all of our customers to winterize their homes and conserve energy by lowering the thermostat when not at home. Zia also offers rebates for installing more

energy efficient natural gas appliances. Winterizing guidelines can be found on our website at www.zngc.com. For customers who need help with winter heating bills, assistance is available through the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) at vour local New Mexico Human Services Division office.

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1 tablespoon olive oil	1 medium onion, sliced thin		
1-pound, skinless chicken breasts, cut into 1-inch cubes	2 Granny Smith apples, peeled, cored and cut into 1-inch cubes

Directions

1. In a large skillet, heat olive oil over medium heat until shimmering. Add cubed chicken and season with salt and pepper. Cook until browned and cooked through, about five minutes. Transfer to a bowl and set aside

- 2. Add Garlic Butter to the skillet. Allow to melt, then add Brussels sprouts, butternut squash, and onion. Season with more salt and pepper, and cook until almost tender, about 8-10 minutes.
- 3. Add apple cubes, thyme, cinnamon, and 1/2 cup chicken broth. Stir to combine and cook until the broth has cooked off, about 2 minutes.
- 4 Add the rest of broth and the reserved chicken. Stir to combine.
- 5. Take off the heat and garnish with crumbled bacon and serve.

Excess Flow Valve Notification for Residential Customers

As required by the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) pipeline safety regulation, 49 CFR 192.383, you are hereby notified that an excess flow valve ("EFV") which meets the minimum DOT performance standards is available for installation on your natural gas service line that operates continuously throughout the year at a pressure not less than 10 psig and does not meet the conditions of 49 CFR-PART 192.383 paragraph (c). Please note that an EFV is not required for the normal, safe operation of your service line, but could help mitigate the consequences of a service line break or rupture.

An EFV is designed to shut off and/or significantly restrict the flow of natural gas automatically if the service line to the customer breaks due to excavation, earthquakes, fire, run over meter sets, augers or other causes. A service line is the piping from the gas distribution main to the customer meter set and may run underground through the customer's yard. EFVs generally do not protect against slow leaks like those caused by loose fittings or leaks beyond the gas meter such as house piping and customer appliances. While the use of an EFV may help to limit the effects of such an incident, the best way to avoid excavation damages is to ensure that those who may have reason to be excavating on your property call 811 prior to digging.

Installation of an EFV is not mandatory. However, if you would like to have an EFV installed in an existing natural gas service line, Zia Natural Gas Company will complete such an installation at a mutually agreeable date for a base cost of \$600 when installed in a plastic service line or a base cost of \$950 when installed in a steel service line. These costs are for labor and material only, and do not include cost(s) associated with local excavation permits, paving, or landscaping work that may be required following the installation. Such costs, if any, will be the responsibility of the property owner. A cost estimate will be provided by Zia Natural Gas Company upon request.

Zia Natural Gas Company makes no warranties, expressed, implied or otherwise, for continued proper excess flow valve operation under any use conditions and/or for inadvertent valve closure under varying gas system operating conditions.


